- A mastery of the theoretical content represented by the text, video lectures, and readings;
- Experience in using these theoretical models to address critical business and economic issues facing our regions and the World;
- Skills in multimedia collaboration;
- Experience in organizing team efforts and managing joint accountability;
- An appreciation of the decision making process in organizations;
- Skills in research; and
- An ethical and international vision for the future.

PREREQUISITES:

The minimum standing for admission into the course is Junior status. You are welcome to discuss any special graduation requirements you might have with your professor. Beyond that, within the context of the course, you are expected to take initiative in applying knowledge you have acquired in prior courses and experience.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

- Attendance: Information exchanges and interactions are an essential part of this course. Therefore, class attendance and participation is expected and evaluated. Students are responsible for all material presented in class. If you are absent from class when a written assignment is due, you must arrange for the material to be shared before the scheduled class meeting. Please consult with the professor if you must be absent from class or unavailable for collaboration.
- *Teaching Methods*: Students are expected to be active participants in <u>all</u> class activities. Student initiated multi-media interactive projects are used as the primary teaching method. Other teaching methods employed will include guided discussion and video lectures.
- *Evaluation:* Your work in this course will be evaluated based on realism, collaboration, reasoned analysis, and quality of presentation. All work must focus on resolving issues identified in this course

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. *Class Participation*: Clearly, participation begins with access, and all students are expected to attend all classes, and to make frequent contact through available media. Absence from class discussion will result in a zero for participation that day. If you have a documented excuse, with approval of the professor you may submit a 2-page analysis for that class session, and make a brief presentation. The project materials should include documentation of multimedia collaboration.
 - 2. **Discussion Notes**: Discussion notes on the appropriate material should be prepared before each class meeting. These notes will assist you in making a substantive contribution to the discussion, whether with the entire class, or with your team. Whenever possible, you are expected to volunteer input to discussions. The professor will ask direct questions.
 - 3. **Project Teams**: Small multi-campus project teams of 4-6 students will be formed to research issues of concern to the global issues and their effect on various economies. Groups will be responsible for all aspects of making decisions from the perspective of a real Massachusetts organization. At the end of the semester, the teams will make live presentations to the entire class. Details about these presentations will be discussed during the semester.
 - 4. *Peer Evaluations*: Group members will complete peer evaluations of one another at the end of the project. Additionally, feedback can be given to any other collaborator during the course. Based on both of these types of evaluations, the professor might adjust your course grade accordingly.
 - 5. *Academic Honesty*: Intellectual honesty is essential to human communication and sustainable enterprise. Integrity is essential to academic life. Consequently, students are expected to maintain high standards of academic honesty and scholarly practice. They shall be responsible for familiarizing themselves with the published policies and procedures regarding academic honesty.
